
Why is mentoring important for Indigenous youth?

- Our language, stories, ceremonies, and songs are becoming obsolete
- Strong sense of Identity if you know who you are and where you come from
- Nurture their voice, feel the presence of their ancestors
- Need to see ourselves as mentors, as capable, as leaders
- · Connect to the nature, language, cosmos, supernatural
- To learn not just to survive but to live

Essential Conditions for Implementing IYMP

Core conditions – conditions necessary for IYMP to be implemented

- Youth Led
- School/Community Specific Autonomy
- Demonstrated Administrative Leadership
- Higher Level Support
- Dedicated Champion(s) to Engage School Community
- Community Support
- Quality And Use of Evidence
- Learning Opportunities
- Rooted in Relationships

Contextual Conditions – determine whether or not the core conditions can be achieved

- Time dedicated time to plan, organize, deliver the program implementation. Easier to implement if you have a person from the community and invest in the community members.
- Funding and Project Support to secure space, equipment and supplies, transportation, and food. What does the community have available.
- Readiness and Understanding having a strong understanding of IYMP and why it is important makes it easier to run the program.

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Supporting Quality Mentoring Relationships for Indigenous Youth



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




